Save Our Soils

MEEN and Debdale Eco Centre are working with Manchester schools to explore the problems of impoverished and contaminated soils in our urban school grounds. The aims of the project are to learn about poor soils, to work on improving them and to share any knowledge gained with members of the community. Although the project has only just begun the Eco teams involved have already discovered all kinds of strange and surprising treasure in their school soil.





Learning about soils

Medlock Primary pupils didn't have to dig deep before discovering bricks and tiles in their school grounds and, using historic maps, they identified the buildings that used to stand on the school site, including their old school.

Ravensbury Primary pupils however, found a good layer of top soil had been added to their grounds when they had been redesigned, although digging in local soil they discovered it was not so healthy. Both schools shared in the discovery of sticky

Manchester clay which gave the pupils from Clayton ideas to discuss about the history of their area.

The project engage the teams with soil experts at the University of Manchester, provide a visit to a brownfield building site which dealt with contaminated soil and take a trip to Debdale Eco Centre to learn about composting and improving soil, amongst other things.

However, the big challenge will be to plan and execute some improvements to each school's soil then to share what they have learnt with their communities.

Network News Greater Manchester's Mayoral Green Summit

The Greater Manchester Mayor,
Andy Burnham, pledged in his
manifesto that: "Within a year of
the election, we will host a
Mayor's Green Summit to declare
a new, accelerated ambition for
Greater Manchester on the green
economy and carbon neutrality. In
the meantime, we will ask experts
and city stakeholders to lead a
public debate on what that new
goal should be."

To this end the Green Summit is being held on 21st March 2018 and, to get input from the public to inform the Summit, the Mayor has asked people to complete a simple survey.

This survey could easily be completed by children, whether as individuals, as an Eco Team, or as a class. There are plenty of smiley/sad faces to click and plenty of options to add comments, suggestions and innovations. It only takes a few minutes for an adult to complete, although with a group discussion it would no doubt take longer.


